Web Accessibility

The Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE) has placed an emphasis on increasing web accessibility for individuals with disabilities in higher education. IBHE funded a Higher Education Cooperative Agreement (HECA) grant to the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign (UI-UC) to facilitate a Web Accessibility Consortium. The purpose of the consortium is to develop institution-level expertise in accessible web design and to develop consortia to improve accessibility in purchased web-based products and resources.

The consortium has provided a wide array of training sessions across the state over the last year. Topics include accessibility in PDF files, Microsoft Office documents, universal web design and Web 2.0. A number of interest groups have been developed to work with corporations on increasing accessibility in their products. The consortium is currently planning activities for the coming year and is seeking continued funding for its work. An accessibility awareness website is in development and will be a resource for Illinois with information, resources, and training for accessible web design. Planning is underway for accessibility new training for web-based content and Office 2007.

The consortium is promoting the use of the Functional Accessibility Evaluator (FAE) tool (http://fae.cita.uiuc.edu/), developed by UI-UC. The FAE tool is a free, web-based instrument that analyzes web content based on best practices in accessibility for individuals with disabilities based on the federal Section 508 and the W3C guidelines. Web developers can use the FAE to evaluate and refine the accessibility of their work. The FAE will be redeveloped in the future to reflect the new Implementation Guidelines developed for the Illinois Information Technology Accessibility Act (IITAA). The guidelines are available at:

City Colleges of Chicago Expand Learning Opportunities and Receive Awards

As we enter 2008, the Center for Distance Learning (CDL) continues its mission to provide technology enhanced, educational opportunities for all distance learning within the seven City Colleges of Chicago (CCC). Through new technology and new allies in education, the CDL and the CCC are broadening horizons locally, nationally and internationally.

Local Expansion

Currently the CDL offers several methods of taking CCC career programs from a distance. One method is strictly online and a other is through televised courses with online components. In 2008 a new course delivery method will be added, iTunes U. In efforts to enhance education though technology, the Apple company has modified their popular iTunes application for use in downloading video and audio course content and materials just as they would songs from the iTunes application. Kennedy-King College is proud to be the only of the seven community colleges of Chicago that has been selected to have its course content through iTunes U. CDL staff members, Mr. Selom Assignon,

Instructional Design Manager, and Mr. Kin Yee, Instructional Technology Manager, are overseeing the iTunes University project development. With the assistance of the Career Programs Department's Dean Jacquie Martin-Hood, iTunes U will launch by the end of the spring 2008 semester.

National Expansion

The CDL has partnered with Muhammad University of Islam (MUI), a predominantly black K-12 school which has campuses across the United States. MUI seeks to expand its educational offerings along with its growing student body, by providing fully online courses and hybrid courses. CDL has agreed to work with MUI on developing a new online curriculum adjusted for pre-college users. The meeting is just the beginning of a long-term collaborative partnership.

International Expansion

KKC, through the Applied Science department and CDL, is developing online courses to train instructors in Ghana. While providing educational opportunities for those who need them most, the CDL has an opportunity to work with learning institutions abroad. The goal of this international partnership is to develop an online program that effectively trains instructors in Ghana in automotive technology, air conditioning and electrical fields. Ghanaian students will complete their certification degree fully online through KKC using Blackboard. This collaboration with technical institutions in Ghana supports KKC's Mission and Purpose to make education accessible to everyone.

In addition to its program expansion, CDL is increasing its participation at national professional distance learning conferences.

Presentations and Awards - IOC and ITC

Dean Darrylinn Todd and Instructional Designer Managers, Troy Harper and Selom Assignon presented **Student Orientations: Their Impact on Online Student Retention and Success**, at the Illinois Online Conference (IOC) which was held on February 13-15, 2008. They shared their strategies, and action plans they've implemented over the last three years and how they have impacted CDL online student retention and success rate.

The conference was held entirely over the internet using: synchronous chat, email, discussion areas and web conference applications. It was created to address issues relating to student services, learning resources, technology support and workforce development.

Also, Dean Darrylinn Todd, Assistant Dean Dr. Marcia Turner, and Instructional Design Manager Dr. Jaami Dawan presented "Secrets for Working with Online Groups," at the Instructional Technology Council (ITC) e-Learning 2008 conference. The e-Learning 2008 conference was held in St. Petersburg, Florida on Feb. 16-19, 2008.

ITC represents higher education institutions in the United States and Canada, and is leader in advancing distance education.

CDL was the recipient of another honor at **e-Learning 2008.** Dr. Audrey Turner, CDL faculty member and professor emeritus of the Social Sciences department from Kennedy-King College was selected by the e-Learning conference planning committee as a finalist for the outstanding e-Learning Faculty award. Dr. Turner went to St. Petersburg, Florida to represent Kennedy-King College and the Center for Distance Learning at the conference luncheon program. It is quite an accomplishment to receive this recognition since the e-Learning Planning Committee received numerous applications for this award.

Tech Tool Talk (full article)

Interested in moving information across a range of Web pages, course pages, or other Web tool? A feed parser is a tool that allows you to take content from a library database, a blog, a podcast, a news site, or other pages that create RSS feeds and place that content in your own Web page (or in Blackboard or Angel). The feed parser generates java script that can be dropped into a Web page. When a student visits the page, the newest content appears. This is a great way to move content from your own blog across several course pages.
