Waubonsee Community College's Online Health Care Interpreting Certificate

In 2003, Waubonsee Community College pioneered an innovative program in health care interpreting. As the non-English speaking population exploded in our district's communities, healthcare organizations struggled to provide high quality and culturally competent care to patients. In the beginning, healthcare organizations simply relied on bilingual staff or family members to interpret for patients. However, it quickly became apparent that mistakes are made and quality care is compromised when interpreters do not have the proper education and training.

With input from district healthcare providers and those working as interpreters, Waubonsee Community College created the health care interpreting program.

It has evolved since 2003 and now includes an associate in applied science degree and two certificates of achievement. In the past year, Waubonsee Community College has fully developed the Health Care Interpreting – Practitioner Certificate of Achievement for online learning. Students will learn the interpreter role, ethics, and problem solving in the interpreter profession. Also, students will network with peers to discuss advocacy issues and communication strategies.

The 16-hour certificate is designed for bilingual individuals of any language with an interest or experience in interpreting. Courses include:

- HCI 102 Survey of Mental Health & Substance Abuse Issues in Health Care Interpreting (3)
- HCI 105 Anatomy and Medical Procedures for Health Care Interpreting (3)
- TRA 100 Introduction to Translation (2)
- AOS 222 Medical Terms for Health Occupations (1)
- COM 125 Communication Strategies for Healthcare Careers (2)
- SOC 120 Racial and Ethnic Relations (3)

For spring 2009, HCI 100 Introduction to Health Care Interpreting, AOS 222 Medical Terms for Health Occupations, and COM 125 Communication Strategies for Health Care Careers will be offered. 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Research to Read (full article)

Discussion of testing integrity has been an issue in distance education since its inception. Although it is a commonly held assumption among most educators teaching in the online format, that cheating in online programs is no greater than what occurs in traditional testing environments, there appears to be greater concern regarding it in distance education. This concern surfaced with the recent passage last month in Washington D. C. by the U.S. Department of Education of the revised provisions for the 1965 Higher Education Act.

According to the Council for Higher Education, <u>HEA Update</u>, <u>dated September 19, 2008</u>, the passed legislation states that "the accreditation of distance education requires that an institution monitor student enrollments to assure that the student who registers for a course or program is the same student who participates and completes a program and obtains the academic credit." How this new legislation will impact distance education programs remains to be seen. But concern is great over the

costs of implementing programs that might require expensive monitoring devices while at the same time protecting students' privacy. Stay tuned...

- 2. The Commoncraft Store website contains videos that are presentation quality and can be purchased by commercial organizations.

These Plain English videos are very short, usually less than 3-4 minutes, and are available on many Web 2.0 topics such as RSS, Twitter, WIKIs, Podcasting as well as titles such as 'Electing a US President' and 'CFL Light Bulbs."

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Tech Tool Talk (full article)

I'm seeking a balance to address faculty training needs.

As a faculty development coordinator, I often become frustrated after spending hours and hours designing training in response to professional development wants and needs of faculty. I send out invitations and registration information, reserve and arrange the room as well as all the other little things to prepare for the session. With much anticipation, I arrive thirty minutes early to set up my materials. Then I wait... and wait. No one shows up.

On the other hand, I have been a full time faculty member. One of the last things I wanted to do in my "free" time was sit through a two or three-hour training session, especially with no guarantee that it would be worth it. "Free" time, of course, was when I graded papers, wrote exams, designed lessons, researched curriculum, etc. Even when the topic was one of marked interest, the other work still had to get done. I'd have to trade personal time or sleep for professional development.

How best do I maximize my time and faculty opportunity?

This year I am going to employ more instructional technology to help find a balance for these two competing forces. Elluminate, Captivate, and even the dreaded PowerPoint will allow me to create some professional development opportunities for faculty to access when it is most convenient for them. All of these file types can be uploaded to a Web site for 24/7, just-in-time learning. Ideally, our college would have a dedicated, professional development LMS to track usage, but it is not necessary. Elluminate has an option for file downloads. This feature can be utilized to send a post-evaluation, embedded right there in the recording. Captivate allows me to build in some interactivity, which can be used for comprehension checks and feedback forms throughout the module. At the most basic level, I can create an email link on the last PowerPoint slide, inviting participants to send me an email with their comments, questions, or concerns. It's not exactly robust data, but it will do.

The drawbacks are obvious: no face to face communication, no real-time discussion, and no reporting system. Still, this may indeed be a solution to an often dysfunctional relationship. I'll write again next year and let you know how the intervention worked out.
